2012 Annual Banquet Honors Six Delawareans



The Delaware Aviation Hall of Fame (DAHF) 2012 Honors Banquet was held on September 29, at the UD Clayton Hall Conference Center with record attendance at almost three hundred participants. Five individuals were inducted into the DAHF and one young man was the recipient of the Youth Aviation Achievement Award. Each was introduced by a "Wingman". Honor. Privilege. These are words usually used by nominees when they are accepting induction into the Delaware Aviation Hall of Fame.

But they are also the words and feelings of the person selected to guide the inductee up to the induction ceremony and finally to actually introduce the newest inductee going into the Hall of Fame. That person is, of course, one of the 'keeper's of the flame', the Wingman.

The Wingman, by definition and in reality, has been that pilot who flies outside and behind the leader of a flying formation. This analogy is appropriate in many ways. The Wingman of the inductee seeks to bring the individual to the fore by successfully presenting the honoree's exploits, accomplishments and contributions to aviation which have brought the inductee to this point in their lives which now will culminate with his or her admission into an elite group. The responsibility of the Wingman is and should be sobering, as this honor to an individual and the ensuing ceremony will only happen once. It is an historic event to the individual, to the public, and to those of us who have an interest in promulgating the extraordinary contributions to aviation of the selected individual and others. It is possible to dilute these contributions if the presenter does not have sufficient awareness of their office. The Delaware Aviation Hall of fame has been fortunate to have Wingmen who have such respect.

It *has been* my honor and privilege to be a Wingman on several occasions. While I may not know how the inductee truly felt about my execution of these responsibilities of Wingman on their behalf, I offer this: when I, myself was inducted in 2006, I was fortunate to have as my Wingman a person who did take the position seriously - Hugh Horning. I hope that Hugh enjoyed his role as much I have for whom I was privileged to be their Wingman.

2013 YOUTH ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

This award is given to the young man or woman who has distinguished himself or herself in aviation training, career development and participation in aviation community activities. Delaware youths 15 to 21 who are pursuing careers in aviation, in the air or on the ground are eligible as are youths enrolled in aviation training programs in Delaware. Supporting materials are encouraged. The nomination itself should not exceed two typewritten pages single-spaced. June 1, 2013 is the deadline for nominations for the 2013 award.

2013 AVIATION HALL OF FAME

If you wish to nominate someone just send us a letter not exceeding two single spaced typed pages. Please explain why you feel your nominee deserves induction into the DAHF. Supporting documents, news articles, citations and photographs are welcome. Qualifications may come from any aspect of space, air or ground involvement in flying. The nominations for consideration in 2013 must be postmarked no later than March 1, 2013. Be sure to include your return address.
